Create a bar graph comparing the birth weights of the baby zoo animals. Label the X axis with the animals and the Y axis with weight in pounds from 0 to 200 at 25 pound increments (0, 25, 50, etc.). Note the birth weight of each animal by coloring a bar at the correct pound increment. Make sure to include a title for your bar graph.
