Discussion Questions

Pugtato takes Thing to each of his spuddies for help in determining what it is. Pugtato's first stop is at Tweetroot's shrub. What does Tweetroot do with Thing? Look closely at the illustration where Tweetroot flies off with Thing. Describe the reactions of Pugtato and the surrounding flowers.

Most of Pugtato's spuddies want to do something to Thing when they see it. When Pugtato brings Thing to Cowbbage however, the character just stares and moos. The Brussels Snouts and Collieflower treat Thing like a toy. How is Croccoli's reaction to Thing different? Why do you think Pugtato runs away with Thing as fast as he can when Croccoli is near?

Activities for Students

The Next Adventure

Pugtato Finds a Thing ends with a happy friendship between Pugtato and Thing, a curly kale snail. The two went through a great deal together on Pugtato's journey to figure out Thing's identity. What do you think happens next for these two new spuddies? Write a sequel to this story. Think of what adventures these two friends could experience. What dialogue would you create between the two main characters? What problem might they face, and how would they solve it? Make sure that your story has a clear beginning, middle, and end. Puppet Story Time

Author/illustrator Sophie Corrigan created an amazing cast of characters for *Pugtato Finds a Thing*. Work together in a group to create popsicle stick puppets for each character in the story. Use Corrigan's illustrations to help you draw each character on paper. Cut out the characters and glue or tape them to craft sticks. What Was Thing Thinking?

In the book, Pugtato and his spuddies do the talking while Thing remains silent. What do you think Thing was thinking or feeling at each encounter? Did he like flying with Tweetroot? Did Purrsnip's scratching feel good? Was it fun to play with Collieflower? Choose one spuddy and create a three-panel comic strip that shows that encounter with Thing. Include thought and/or speech bubbles that reveal how Thing felt during the interaction.
