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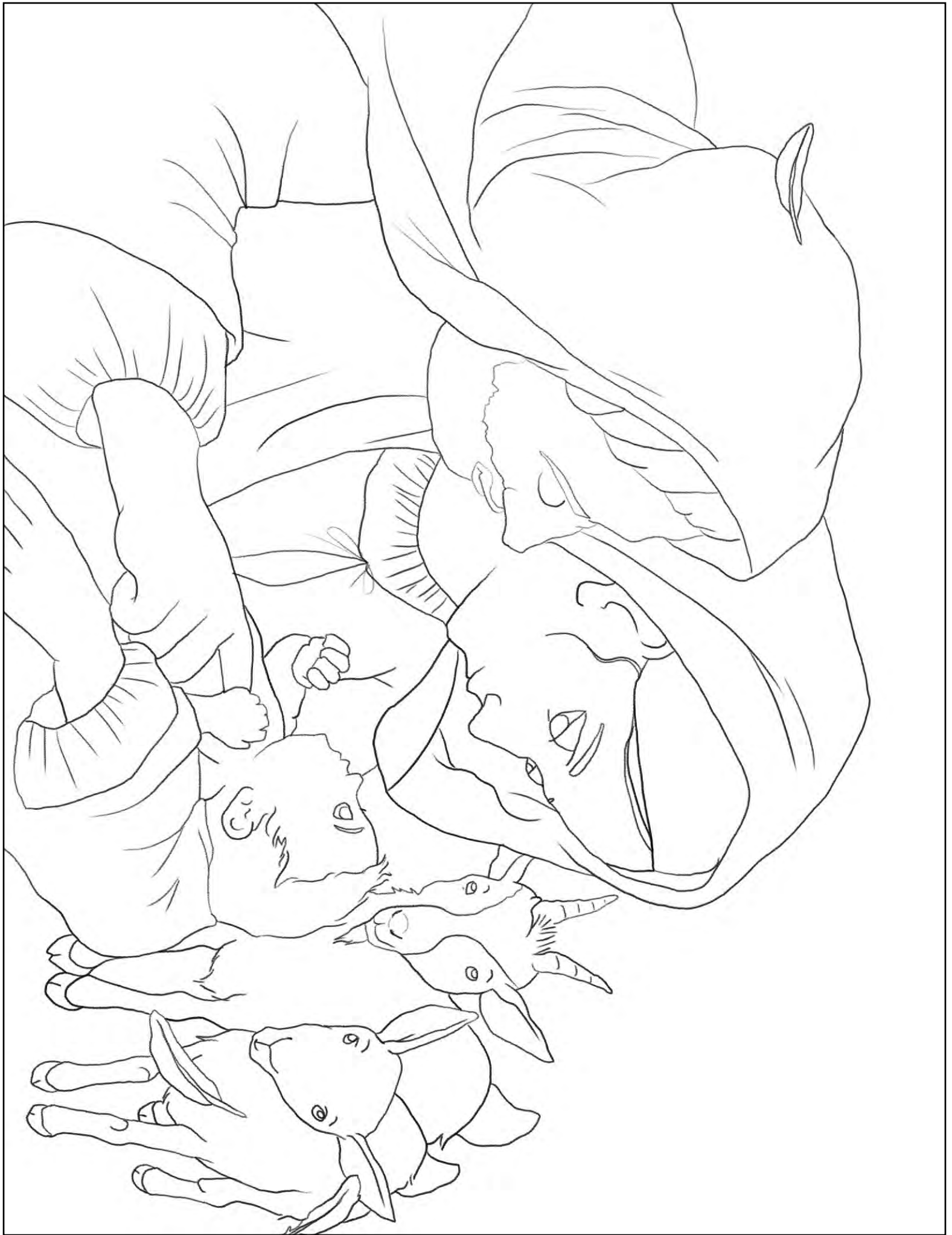
Christmas Ornaments

- Thread a ribbon through, tie & hang on the tree.



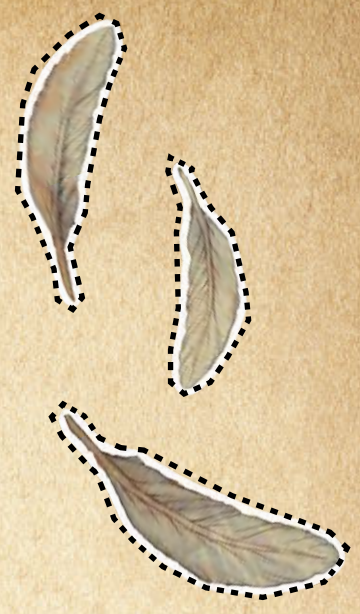






Make Your Own Nativity Scene

Cut out the pictures below and glue onto the next page to make your own Nativity scene.

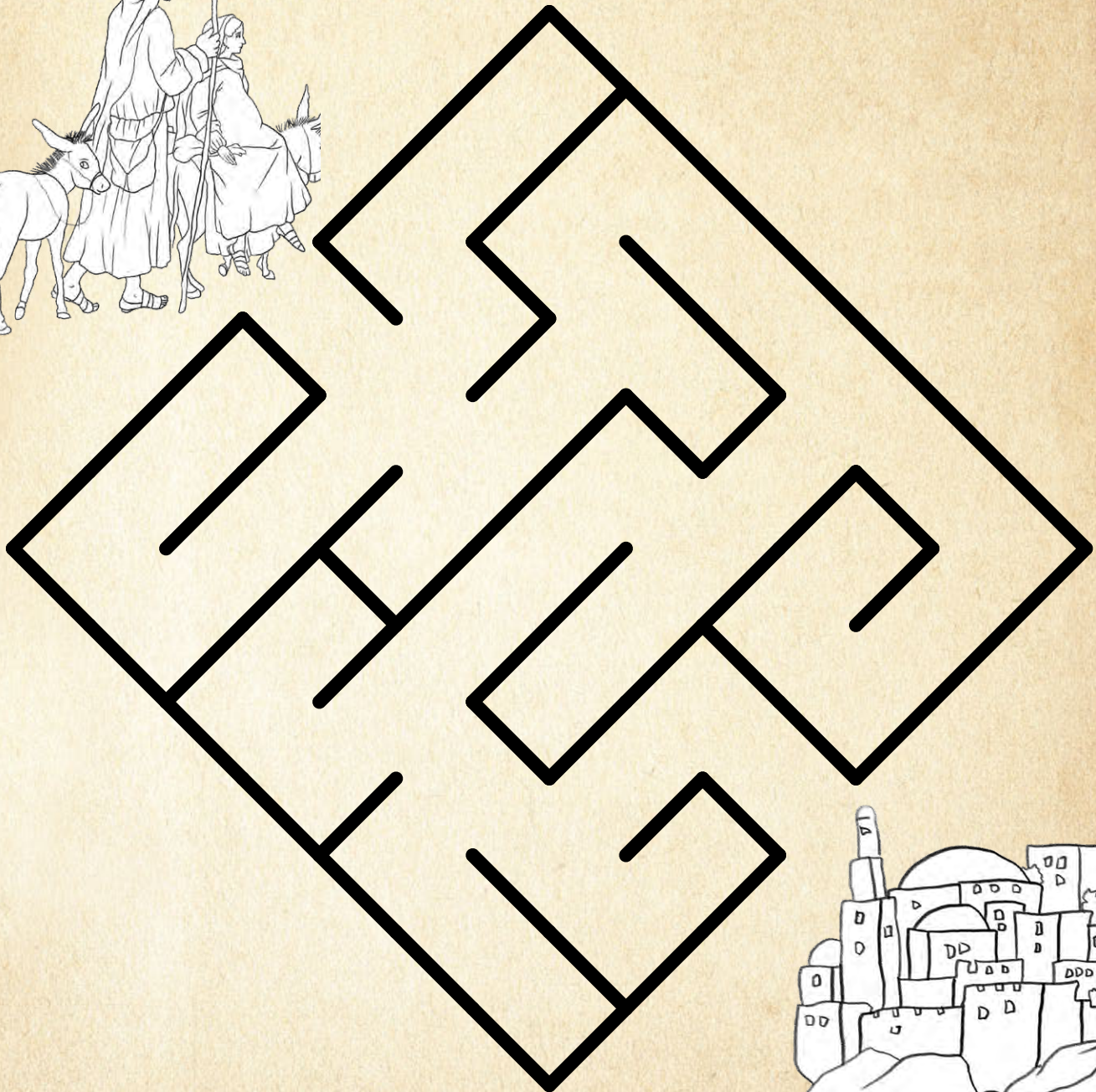

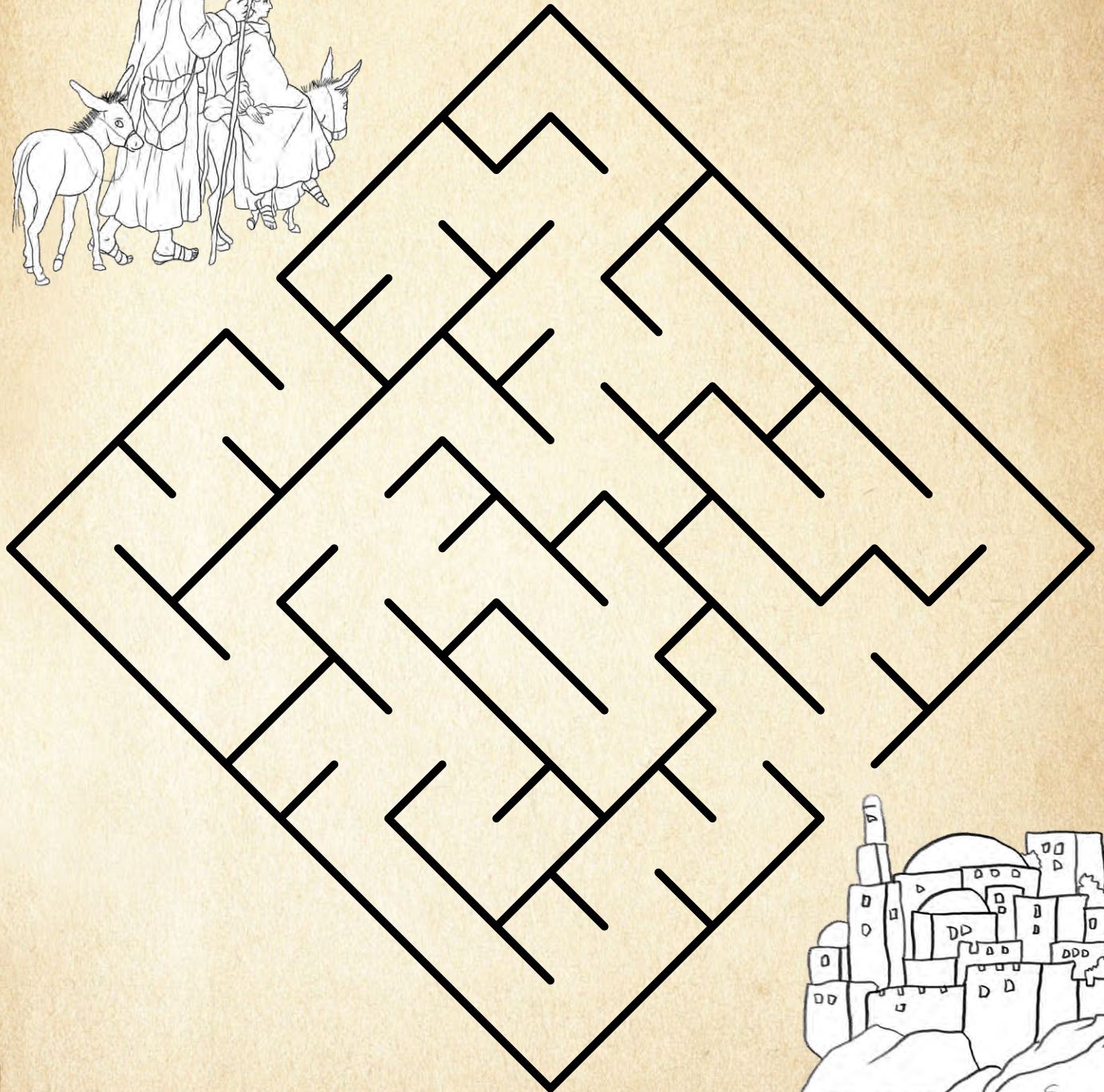

And he looked like a peddler just opening his pack.

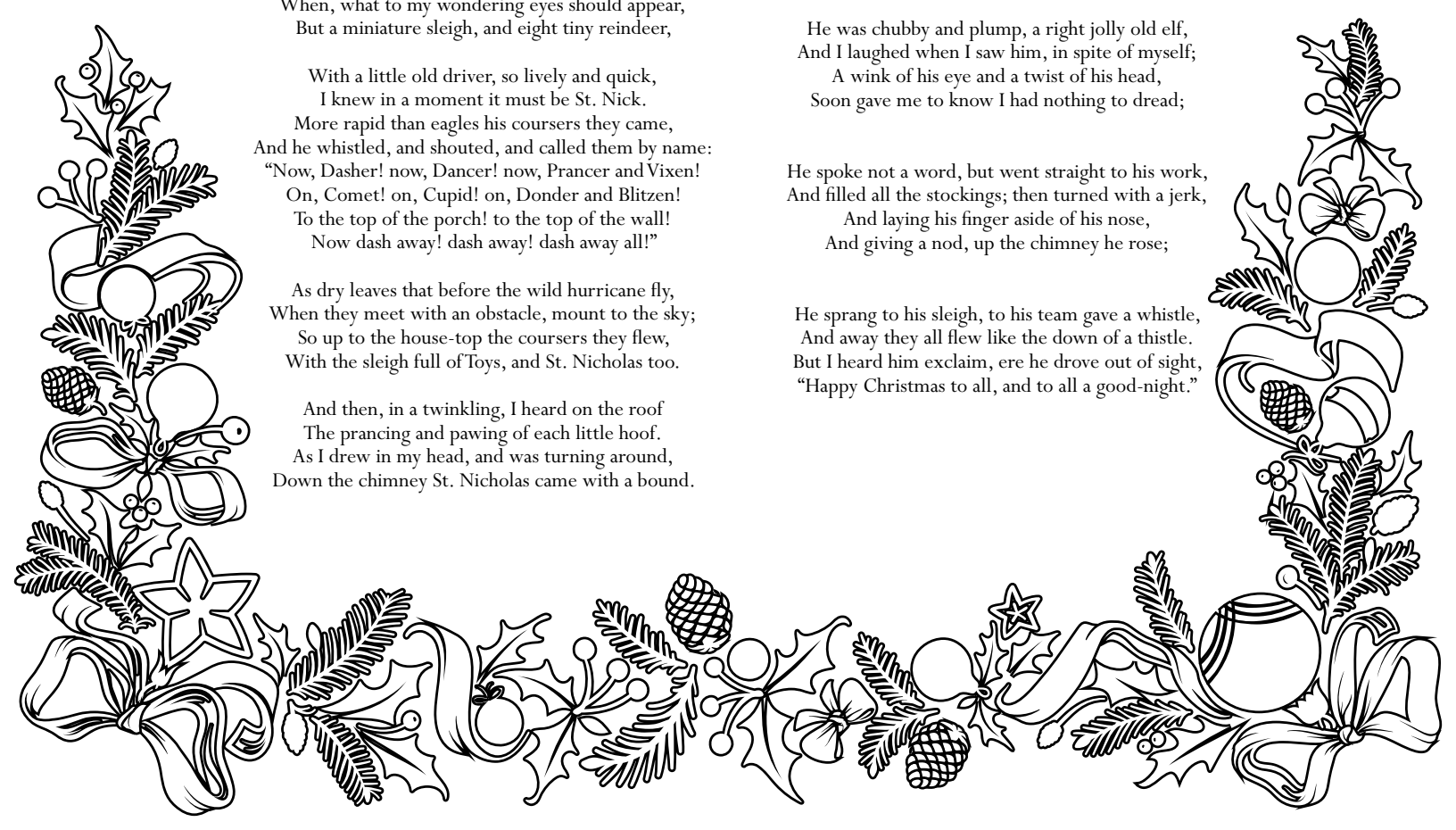
His eyes--how they twinkled! his dimples how merry!

And giving a nod, up the chimney he rose;

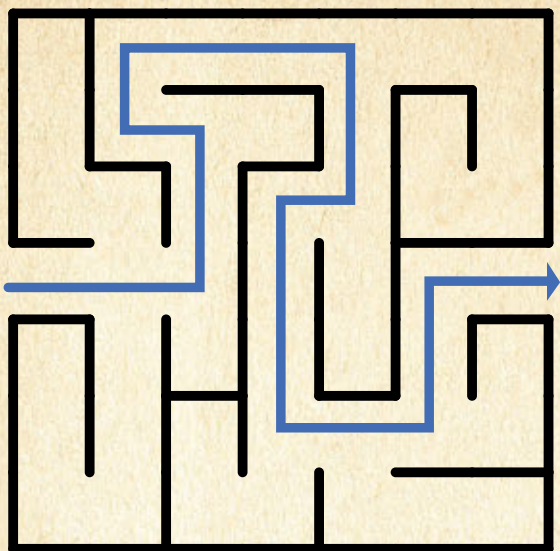
He sprang to his sleigh, to his team gave a whistle,

"Happy Christmas to all, and to all a good-night."



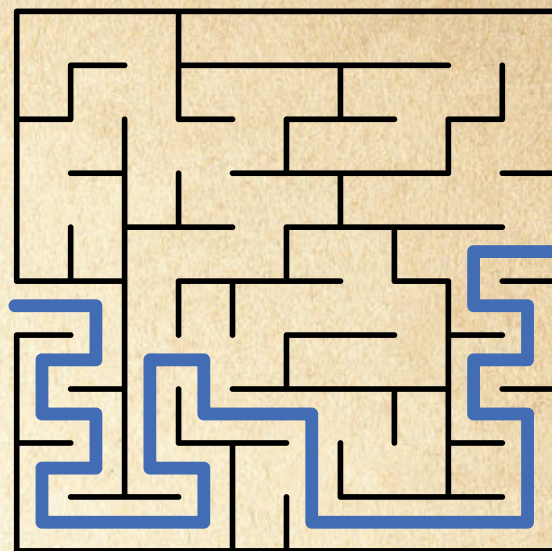

Twas the Evening of Christmas Pageant

This simple Christmas pageant, based on using the book, *Twas the Evening of Christmas*, can be used with any number of children. Using one or two narrators, the story is read from the book as children act it out. If your church has projection capabilities, the best effect will be achieved if you project the pages from the book as they are being read, but only if you have obtained permission from Zondervan first. Please contact <https://www.zondervan.com/about-us/permissions/> to obtain permission. Zondervan can also provide high resolution scans of these images. However there will be a fee associated with this.

This pageant is flexible. It can be used as a full-blown production with all the costumes, or a simple, unrehearsed nativity pageant, using character/nativity masks held on craft sticks. It is assumed that a simple manger scene be set up at the front and center of the church. All songs are optional and may be sung by the children or by the congregation.

WHAT YOU WILL NEED:

- Book: *Twas the Evening of Christmas* by Glenys Nellist
- Costumes or masks
- Simple nativity scene/backdrop
- Doll for Baby Jesus
- Three 'gifts' for the kings

WHO YOU NEED:

- 1 or 2 Narrators
- Mary & Joseph
- Three Kings (or however many you like!)
- Shepherds
- Animals (any kind)
- Angels





PREPARATION:

Shepherds and angels should be grouped at the front of the church, off center. All other participants are gathered at the back of church, except for some animals who should already be sitting in the stable. Baby Jesus should be hidden behind the manger.

SCRIPT

Narrator 1: Twas the evening of Christmas, when all through the town,
Every inn was so crowded, no room could be found.
Tired Mary and Joseph, who went door to door,
At last found a place on a small stable floor.
Mary & Joseph make their way to the stable, accompanied by music.

Narrator 2: “Thank goodness”, said Mary, who tiptoed inside.
The mice saw the donkey and scurried to hide!
The rest of the creatures all cuddled up tight.
In hopes that they might have a calm, peaceful night.
Mary & Joseph sit either side of manger.

SONG: O LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM VERSE 1

Narrator 1: The pigeons were nestled all snug in their beds,
While visions of breadcrumbs danced ‘round in their heads.
The cows closed their eyes, and the oxen laid down;
The doves cooed so gently; the lambs made no sound.

Narrator 2: The moon, through the trees, was just starting to glow
With a glimmer of light on the stable below.
When quite by surprise came a newborn babe’s cry
That woke all the animals sleeping nearby.
A hidden actor makes the sound of a baby crying. Mary lifts baby Jesus from behind manger and cuddles him. All animals jump up.

Narrator 1: Up jumped the cows, and the oxen and sheep.
Up popped the pigeons, aroused from their sleep.
They all came to gaze at the small baby boy,
As his mama and papa hugged him with joy.
Animals gather around Mary, baby & Joseph. They make loud ‘awww’ noises.

Narrator 2: Now donkeys, now cows, now pigeons, and sheep,
Now oxen and mice in the manger did peep.
His eyes, how they twinkled, his dimples so sweet,
As they nuzzled his fingers and cute little feet.





SONG: BABY JESUS FAST ASLEEP BY GLENYS NELLIST

For best effect, the animals should sing this, to the tune of Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star.

Baby Jesus, fast asleep, *Bring arms together & rock back & forth as if holding baby*

Tiny hands and tiny feet. *Lift up hands & hold out in front; point to feet.*

Baby Jesus, we love you, *Fold arms across chest*

And we know you love us too. *Point to self*

Baby Jesus, fast asleep, *Bring arms together & rock back & forth as if holding baby*

Tiny hands and tiny feet. *Lift up hands & hold out in front; point to feet.*

Animals return to their places, sitting in stable.

Narrator 1: And out in the fields, taking care of their sheep,
Some shepherds were just getting ready to sleep.
When all of a sudden, they had such a fright,
As a whole choir of angels lit up the night.
Angels & shepherds stand. Shepherds shield their eyes.

Narrator 2: But the song of the angels; the words that they said,
Soon let the men know they had nothing to dread.
“Dear shepherds! It’s wonderful news that we bring
A savior is born—he is Jesus, the king!”
(Optional: Have one of the angels speak these two lines.)

Narrator 1: They ran to the stable and peeked through the door,
And saw something never imagined before!
There, in a manger, a baby boy lay—
No blankets, no pillows, his bed made of hay.
*Angels & shepherds now make their way to the manger scene, perhaps taking different aisles,
or routes, as music is played or first verse of ‘Go, Tell It On The Mountain’ is sung.*





Narrator 2: And to that small stable came three splendid kings
With gifts for the baby—all beautiful things.
They jumped from their camels and knelt at his feet
With their frankincense, gold, and myrrh that smelled sweet.
3 kings to stable, as music is played. They place their gifts in stable & stay there.

Narrator 1: The stable was filled with a wonderful light
As stars above Bethlehem twinkled so bright.
And high in the heavens, God whispered, “My Son,
You’ll bring hope to the world and love everyone.”

Narrator 2: Then back to their slumbers the animals curled,
Amazed at this babe who had entered their world.
As Mary and Joseph got ready for bed,
They snuggled their baby and kissed his sweet head.
Animals lie down, Mary & Joseph cuddle Jesus.

SONG: AWAY IN A MANGER VERSE 1

Narrator 1: As Mary laid Jesus, asleep, in the hay,
She thought about all that had happened that day.
The mice heard her whisper, as she tucked him in tight,
“Merry Christmas, my son, and to all ... a good night.
Mary puts baby in manger & leans down to kiss him.

SONG: AWAY IN A MANGER VERSE 2 & 3

PRAYER:

Thank you, God, for that special night in Bethlehem when your son was born. Thank you for the angels, the shepherds, the animals and the wise men. Thank you for Mary and Joseph. Most of all, thank you for Jesus. Amen.



'Twas the Evening of Christmas StoryWalk:

An Intergenerational Activity

Designed as an intergenerational activity that takes place indoors or outdoors, the StoryWalk invites participants to read one page of the story as they walk through 15 stations.

WHAT YOU WILL NEED:

- 15 foam boards
- Each double spread from the book, enlarged & laminated. EITHER photocopy OR request the high res scans (for a small fee) from HCCPpermissions@harpercollins.com.
- 15 stakes or supports on which the boards will be displayed.
- Copies of 'Twas the Evening of Christmas to be given to families at the end of the walk, OR Christmas goody-bags OR both.

WHAT TO DO:

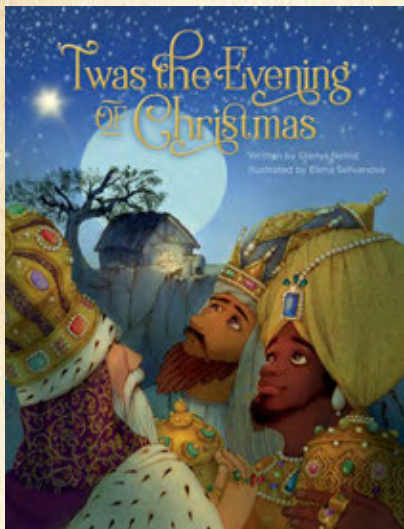
- Attach the 15 enlarged double spreads from the book onto the foam boards.
- Attach the boards to the stakes.
- Number them in large numerals 1-15.
- On the first board that displays the title page, write your instructions for the StoryWalk. For example: *START HERE! Welcome to the 'Twas the Evening of Christmas StoryWalk. Follow the path to begin the story. Continue until you reach the end. Each stop will be the next page of the story. Have fun!* You could also include an arrow showing the direction to the next stop.
- Work out where to place each stop and how the stakes will be held in place.
- Decide what to give families at the end. A free book would be fun! (Visit churchsource.com for up to 50% off bulk buys. Any US order of \$30+ will also be free shipping and tax exempt.)
- Include a Christmas goody bag, containing the coloring or activity sheets from this pack, a Christmas craft or stickers.

FUN OPTIONS:

- Have people at each stop, dressed as characters: Mary & Joseph/shepherds/angels/ wise men.
 - Have Christmas carols playing in the background.
 - Include a bonfire at the shepherd stop, with supplies for s'mores.
- Include fun details on each StoryWalk sign, such as things to spot in the pictures, or wondering questions. For example, on the spread where the shepherds are looking up, *I wonder what the shepherds are thinking...*

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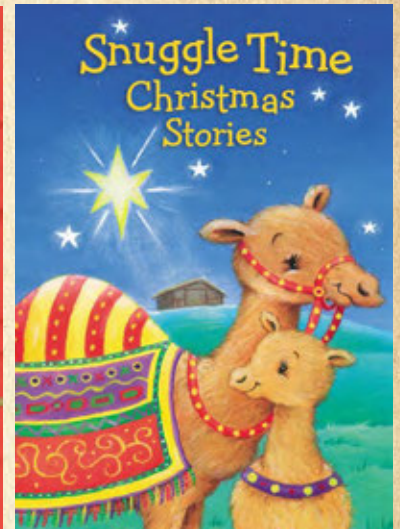
