N THIS ADORABLE PICTURE BOOK written by Dan McKernan of the popular TV show *Saved by the Barn,* the rescue farm animals at Barn Sanctuary decide to help a cow who is dealing with fear and anxiety in her new home. Children will learn the importance of friendship and compassion through this charming story, as well as why it's important to support others during hard times.

The book contains information about the real Barn Sanctuary in Michigan and their efforts to rescue and support over 100 farmed animals, including Ginger, Buttercup, Little Dude, and Mike, who are featured in the story.

Discussion Questions

Before Reading

Look carefully at the cover of This Farm Is a Family. What is the setting of the story? Brainstorm and record what you know about the setting and what you want to learn about it. After reading the story, add information to a third column on the brainstorming chart to show what you learned about the setting from reading This Farm Is a Family. After Reading





What exciting news does Dan share with the animals and how do they react to the news?

What strategies did the animal family use to try to connect with Buttercup?

Activities

Take a STEM Challenge!

Design a pen that is safe and secure enough to house Buttercup. What would Buttercup need to be housed safely? Draw a diagram of your plan and label the different parts of the pen. Gather building materials such as popsicle sticks, pipe cleaners, straws, clay, snap cubes, and Legos to build a model of your design. Take a gallery walk of all of the different models of pens for Buttercup in your class. Discuss the advantages of each design.

Animal Research

Several types of animals comprise the family of creatures at Barn Sanctuary. Select one animal represented in the story and research that animal's life cycle, what it eats, and its adaptations. Compile the information from your research into a report about your selected animal. Include a labeled diagram of your chosen animal.

Sentence Building

Use 3 x 5-inch notecards to make a set of word cards on based on *This Farm Is a Family.* First, make a card for each character in the story. Then, make sets of word cards of action words in the story, such as "fed," "ran," "jumped," and "rolled." Then, make a set of word cards for places in the story, such as "in the pigpen," "behind the barn," and "in the field." Last, make cards for common connecting words such as "with" and "and." Use these word cards to build sentences in a pocket chart. Build your sentences in this order: Who? Did what? To or with whom? Where? Example: "Farmer Dan fed Little Dude in the pigpen." Portrait Math

Choose a favorite character from *This Farm Is a Family* and draw his or her portrait. Display all the character portraits in your classroom. Tally the number of portraits of each character and use this data to create a bar graph of favorite characters from the story. Discuss the results of the data shown on the bar graph. Which animal from the story did most students choose? Were there any characters who had an equal number of fans?
