

Israel's first king was Saul, but he did not obey God. Then God chose a humble shepherd named David who would be a good king and servant for his people. Read 1 Samuel 16:1-13, memorize the Words to Treasure verse (1 Samuel 16:7) and do the Live It! Activity. This passage tells us what God looks for in a person.

Fight against them until you have wiped them out.'

²²But Samuel replied,

"What pleases the LORD more? Burnt offerings and sacrifices, or obeying him?

It is better to obey than to offer a sacrifice.

It is better to do what he says than to offer the fat of rams.

²³ Refusing to obey him is as sinful as using evil magic.

Being proud is as evil as worshiping statues of gods.

You have refused to do what the LORE told you to do.

So he has refused to have you as king."

²⁴Then Saul said to Samuel, "I have sinned. I've broken the LORD's command. I haven't done what you directed me to do. I

was afraid of the people. So I did what they said I should do. ²⁵Now I beg you, forgive my sin. Come back into town with me so I can worship the LORD."

26But Samuel said to him, "I won't go back with you. You have refused to do what the LORD told you to do. So he has refused to have you as king over Israe!!"

²⁷Samuel turned to leave. But Saul grabbed hold of the hem of his robe, and it tore.

²⁸Samuel said to Saul, "The LORD has torn the kingdom of Israel away from you today. He has given it to one of your neighbors. He has given it to someone who is better than you. ²⁹The One who is the Glory of Israel does not lie. He doesn't change his mind. That's because he isn't a mere man. If he were, he might change his mind."

³⁰Saul replied, "I have sinned. But please honor me in front of the elders of my people and in front of Israel. Come back with me so I can worship the LORD your God."

31So Samuel went back with Saul. And Saul worshiped the LORD.

³²Then Samuel said, "Bring me Agag, the king of the Amalekites."

Agag wasn't afraid when he came to Samuel. He thought, "The time for me to be put to death must have passed by now."

"Your sword has killed the children of other women.

So the child of your mother will be killed "


Samuel put Agag to death at Gilgal in the sight of the LORD.

³⁴Then Samuel left to go to Ramah. But Saul went up to his home in Gibeah of Saul. ³⁵Until the day Samuel died, he didn't go to see Saul again. Samuel was filled with sorrow because of Saul. And the LORD was very sorry he had made Saul king over Israel.

Samuel Anoints David to Be Israel's King

The LORD said to Samuel, "How long will you be filled with sorrow because of Saul? I have refused to have him as king over Israel. Fill your animal horn with olive oil and go on your way. I am sending you to Jesse in Bethlehem. I have chosen one of his sons to be king."





²But Samuel said, "How can I go? Saul

will hear about it. Then he'll kill me."

The LORD said, "Take a young cow with you. Tell the elders of Bethlehem, 'I've come to offer a sacrifice to the LORD.' 3Invite Jesse to the sacrifice. Then I will show you what to do. You must anoint for me the one I point out to you."

4Samuel did what the LORD said. He arrived at Bethlehem. The elders of the town met him. They were trembling with fear. They asked, "Have you come in peace?"

⁵Samuel replied, "Yes, I've come in peace. I've come to offer a sacrifice to the LORD. Set yourselves apart to him and come to the sacrifice with me."

Then he set Jesse and his sons apart to the LORD. He invited them to the sacrifice.

⁶When they arrived, Samuel saw Eliab. He thought, "This has to be the one the LORD wants me to anoint for him."

⁷But the LORD said to Samuel, "Do not consider how handsome or tall he is. I have

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not chosen him. I do not look at the things people look at. Man looks at how someone appears on the outside. But I look at what is in the heart."

8Then Jesse called for Abinadab. He had him walk in front of Samuel. But Samuel said, "The LORD hasn't chosen him either.

⁹Then Jesse had Shammah walk by. But Samuel said, "The LORD hasn't chosen him either."

¹⁰Jesse had seven of his sons walk in front of Samuel. But Samuel said to him, "The LORD hasn't chosen any of them." ¹¹So he asked Jesse, "Are these the only sons you have?

"No," Jesse answered. "My youngest son is taking care of the sheep.

Samuel said, "Send for him. We won't sit down to eat until he arrives."

¹²So Jesse sent for his son and had him brought in. His skin was tanned. He had a fine appearance and handsome features.

Then the LORD said, "Get up and anoint him. He is the one.'

13So Samuel got the animal horn that was filled with olive oil. He anointed David in front of his brothers. From that day on, the Spirit of the LORD came on David with power. Samuel went back to Ramah.

What is important About You?

What is the first thing you notice when a new student comes to your school? Read 1 Samuel 16:1–13. Samuel was looking for a new king for Israel. When he saw Jesse's tall, handsome son Eliab, he thought he had found the new king. But he was looking at the wrong thing. Samuel was looking at the outside. What part of a person is most important to God? That's right. The inside!

Jesus set an example for us so that we know what it looks like in action to be humble. This story tells us about how he served his disciples.




Jesus Humbles Himself in Front of His Disciples John 13:1-17



He wanted his disciples to know how much he loved them. Before they started to eat, Jesus got up from the table. He poured water into a bowl and knelt down in front of Peter. Jesus began to wash Peter's dirty feet. Peter was confused. He didn't understand why Jesus was kneeling to do the humble job of a servant.


"No!" said Peter. "You can't wash my feet."

KEY VERSE:

Think of others as better than yourselves.

—Philippians 2:3

This devotional teaches us that we should put others before ourselves because God loves us all.



Every single person in our world is valuable, precious, and made in God's image. Sometimes we forget that and think that we're more important than others.



And sometimes we believe certain people are more valuable than others.

But God wants us to see things differently.

Jesus spent a lot of time with people whom others disliked or thought were unimportant.

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He saw people for exactly who they were. Each one of them was precious to him and he loved them all equally because we are all God's children. We should live that way too!



In fact, Jesus says we should always put others first—that's what it means to be humble (and it's one big way we share God's love).

When we treat others as valuable (and don't see ourselves as more important than anyone else), we are loving the way God wants us to.


"You always give Job everything he needs," Satan replied.

The LORD said to Satan, "All right. I am handing everything he has over to you. But do not touch the man himself."

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




In spite of everything, Job didn't say anything that was sinful. After Job had prayed for his friends, the LORD made him successful again. He gave him twice as much as he had before. All his brothers and sisters and everyone who had known him before came to see him. They ate with him in his house. They showed their concern for him. They comforted him because of all the troubles the LORD had brought on him. Each one gave him a piece of silver and a gold ring. The LORD blessed the last part of Job's life even more than the first part.

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We can learn about the importance of being humble in 1 and 2 Samuel. The king of Israel needed to depend on God to protect his people rather than relying on his own strength or knowledge. This section includes a devotion and many fun exercises to learn about humility.



The kings of other nations depended on their own wisdom and strength. They were proud. But the king of Israel was not supposed to be like those kings! The kings of Israel were supposed to depend on the wisdom and strength of God. They were supposed to be humble. Saul was the first king of Israel. But Saul became like the kings of other nations. He became proud of himself and his authority. So, God made Saul humble by choosing someone else to be king!

God chose David to be the next king of his people. David was humble and depended on God. So, God gave David great honor. Sometimes David disobeyed God. But when he did, David admitted he had sinned and he returned to God. So, God promised to provide a king from David's family line. God said that this king would rule forever!

David did wrong things but later told the truth about them. Can you think of a time when you did something wrong? You either lied or disobeyed? What happened after that?


David wrote a song of praise to God near the end of 1 & 2 Samuel. In this song David says something very important about proud people and humble people.






Dear heavenly Father,

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ACTIVITIES NI_rV::

This activity reminds us what it feels like to be humble and ask others for help when we need it.

HUMBLE PUZZLES

STUFF YOU NEED:

- Blindfolds (one for every two people doing the activity)
- Hair elastics (one for every two people doing the activity)
- Simple wooden puzzles (1 for every two people doing the activity or the same puzzle can be used by each two-person group)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Show the children a simple wooden puzzle.
- Ask, How many of you think you could complete this puzzle easily? This looks like an easy puzzle that might be challenging only for a young baby or toddler, right?
- Ask for a volunteer who is willing to have the leader place a hair elastic around their hands behind their back. Be sure the elastic is loose enough so that it does not cut off circulation. If the elastic is too tight on a child, that child may simply hold their hands behind their back.
- Give the volunteer a simple wooden puzzle to complete. The children will quickly realize that the volunteer cannot complete the puzzle.
- Ask, Do you feel a little silly or embarrassed because you can't complete this puzzle that a little toddler could do? Do you think you need to ask for help to complete this puzzle? Pretty humbling, isn't it?
- Ask for another volunteer who is willing to wear a blindfold.
- Give that volunteer a chance to attempt the puzzle. Although they might be able to assemble a few pieces, it will be difficult.
- Say, Everyone has limitations. We have different strengths and weaknesses. When we
 work together, we can overcome our own weaknesses and limitations. However, having
 limitations means that we must practice humility. We have to be humble and ask for help
 and recognize that we can honor others for their gifts, even gifts that are above our
 own abilities.
- Assign each child a partner. One partner will wear the blindfold and the other will place a hair elastic around their hands behind their back or simply hold their hands behind their back. Help children place the elastics on their wrists and place blindfolds, if necessary.
- Give each pair a wooden puzzle to complete together, with one partner directing and the other partner assembling.
- Switch roles and allow them to assemble the puzzle again. (As an option, you could also do this as a family activity rather than with partners. Have one child put the puzzle together blindfolded and ask the rest of the group to give directions.

This activity reminds us about the importance of putting others before ourselves.

PRIDE AND HUMILITY

STUFF YOU NEED:

- Pride and Humility sheet (one per child)
- Crayons or markers

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Explain that there are many opportunities to show humility by putting others first.
- Say, When I get on the school bus, I could race to the front and snatch the best seat. That would be putting myself first. When I put others first, I wait my turn to board the bus. I say, "Excuse me," if I bump someone. I even look around to see if others need a good seat and I let them have mine.
- Allow the child to choose from situations like the ones below:
 - o Waiting in the lunch line at school
 - o Playing on a playground
 - o Taking a long car ride
 - o Going to a movie
 - o Choosing a partner for a game
- Give each child a Pride and Humility sheet.
- Instruct the child to choose a situation and write it on their paper. They can then use the two columns of the paper to write about and illustrate the different responses.
- Allow time for the child to write about and illustrate each scenario. Remind them to include words, actions, and feelings in their descriptions. When they are finished, encourage the child to discuss their situations and responses with you.

Finding Jesus in Mark
Mark reminds believers that if anyone didn't deserve to suffer, it was Jesus. But Mark reminds believers that God used Jesus' suffering to accomplish some truly wonderful things.
