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Harriet Tubman



While Harriet Tubman is well-known for helping enslaved Black people escape to freedom on the Underground Railroad, she also led Union soldiers on the Combahee River Raid in 1863 that freed more than 700 enslaved people in a single night.

Ida B. Wells



Ida B. Wells was an investigative journalist who wrote about killings of Black Americans living in the South in late 1800s. She brought these senseless deaths to national attention.

Denmark Vesey



Denmark Vesey organized what would have been one of the most ambitious slave rebellions in US history if the plan had not been given away by fellow enslaved people beforehand.

Frederick Douglass



Frederick Douglass escaped from slavery and wrote several autobiographies about his experience. He was a national leader for the anti-slavery movement in the 1800s and was known for his powerful speeches.

Phyllis Wheatley



Phyllis Wheatley is credited as being the first enslaved woman to publish a book of poetry in North America. She was one of the best-known poets in America during the late 1700s.

Martin Luther King Jr.



Martin Luther King, Jr. was a minister and activist who promoted nonviolent resistance to achieve equal rights for Black Americans. He is one of the most important figures in the American Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964.
